

# Tarrant County COVID-19 Recovery Report

Administrator's Office

Reporting Period: Sept. 19 – Sept. 25

#### **Summary**

The Tarrant County COVID-19 Recovery Report provides information on current and upcoming COVID-related programs administered by the County. Additional information will be provided as new programs are implemented. Information related to grant funding applications and awards is also included. The Tarrant County COVID-19 Recovery Report is provided to the Commissioners Court and the public on Tuesdays. Programs currently administered by the County include:

#### **Call for Proposals: Community Programs**

Tarrant County requested proposals for projects from nonprofit, local government, and quasi-governmental agencies that respond to the focus areas and goals guiding the County's response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Proposals were accepted in the following areas: Improve Public Health and Wellness; Revitalize the Economy; and Strengthen the Community. The application window closed on May 16 at 5 p.m. 131 applications from 95 organizations were received with a total request amount of \$208 million. Funding recommendations for 35 projects totaling \$35.5 million were approved by Commissioners Court on July 26. A complete list of funded projects is available in Appendix A.



#### **Tarrant County Small Business Workforce Recovery Grant Program**

The Tarrant County Commissioners Court allocated \$25 million in federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding to assist small businesses impacted by COVID-19 with workforce recovery, retention, recruitment, training, and development efforts. Impacted for-profit and non-profit small businesses that had 50 or fewer employees during the First Quarter of 2020 can apply for grants up to \$27,500 based on eligibility requirements and employee count. Grant applications opened at noon on July 11 and at 5 p.m. on August 31. A map of applications by city is available in Appendix D. The first group of grant awards was approved and distributed on August 9 and continue to be awarded weekly as applications are reviewed and processed.



#### **Other Recovery Updates**

**Small Business** 

•The Tarrant County Small Business Workforce Recovery Grant program opened to applications on Monday, July 11 at noon and closed on August 31 at 5 p.m. Applications are being reviewed and awarded on a rolling basis. Staff will provide weekly updates to Commissioners Court.

**Childcare** 

•A subrecipient agreement with Child Care Associates for the first two strategies of the County's \$45 million child care program was approved by Commissioners Court on August 2. A Request for Applications for these strategies was issued by Child Care Associates on September 20; responses are due on October 20, 2022.

Housing

•On August 16, Commissioners Court voted to approve the proposed uses of \$32.5 million for permanent supportive, supportive and deeply affordable housing development. Staff is working with Tarrant County Homeless Coalition and the Tarrant County Community Development department to develop Requests for Proposals for this program.

Innovative Emergency Management (IEM)

•IEM continues to work with staff on Phase 3 of Tarrant County's ARPA-FRF Program. Current activities include: Small Business Workforce Recovery Grant Program and publicfacing reporting.




