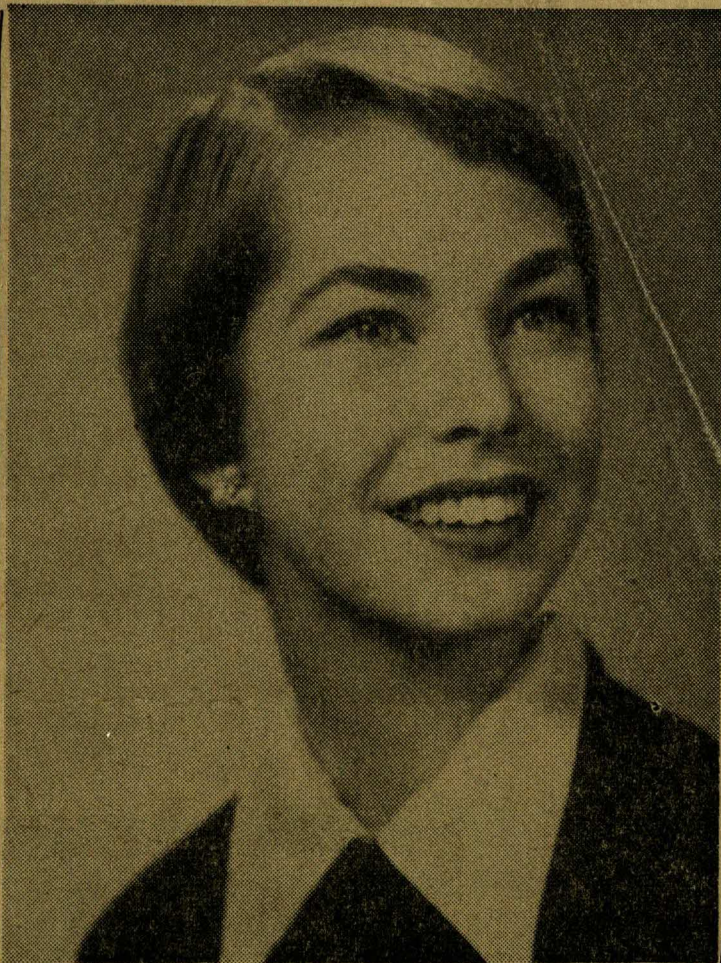

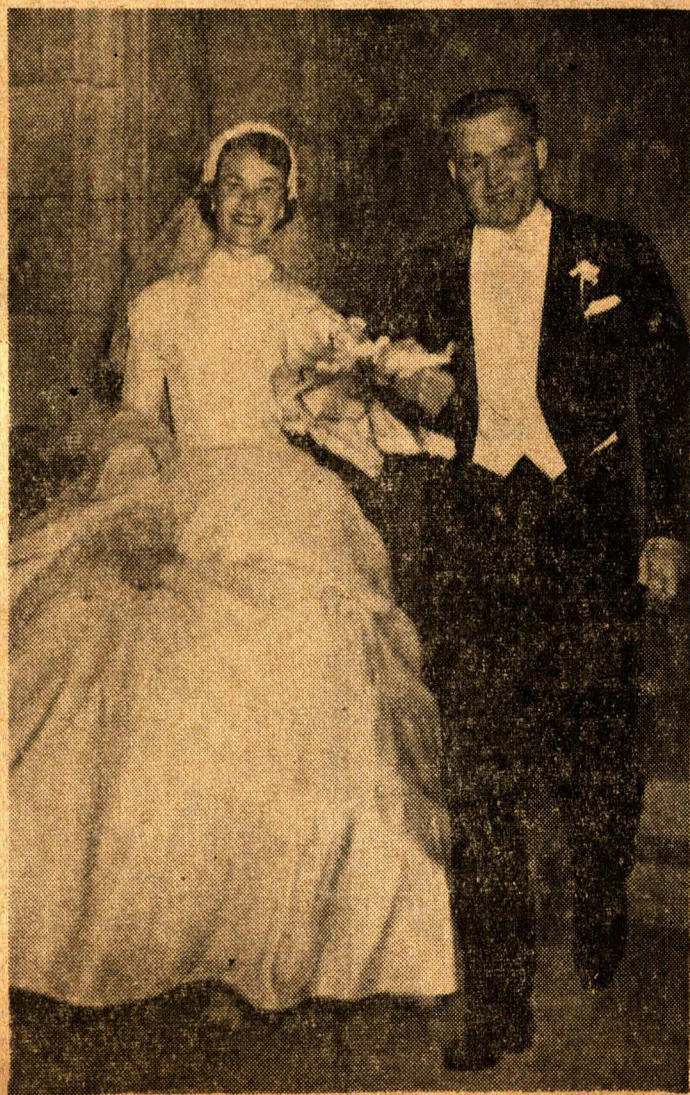

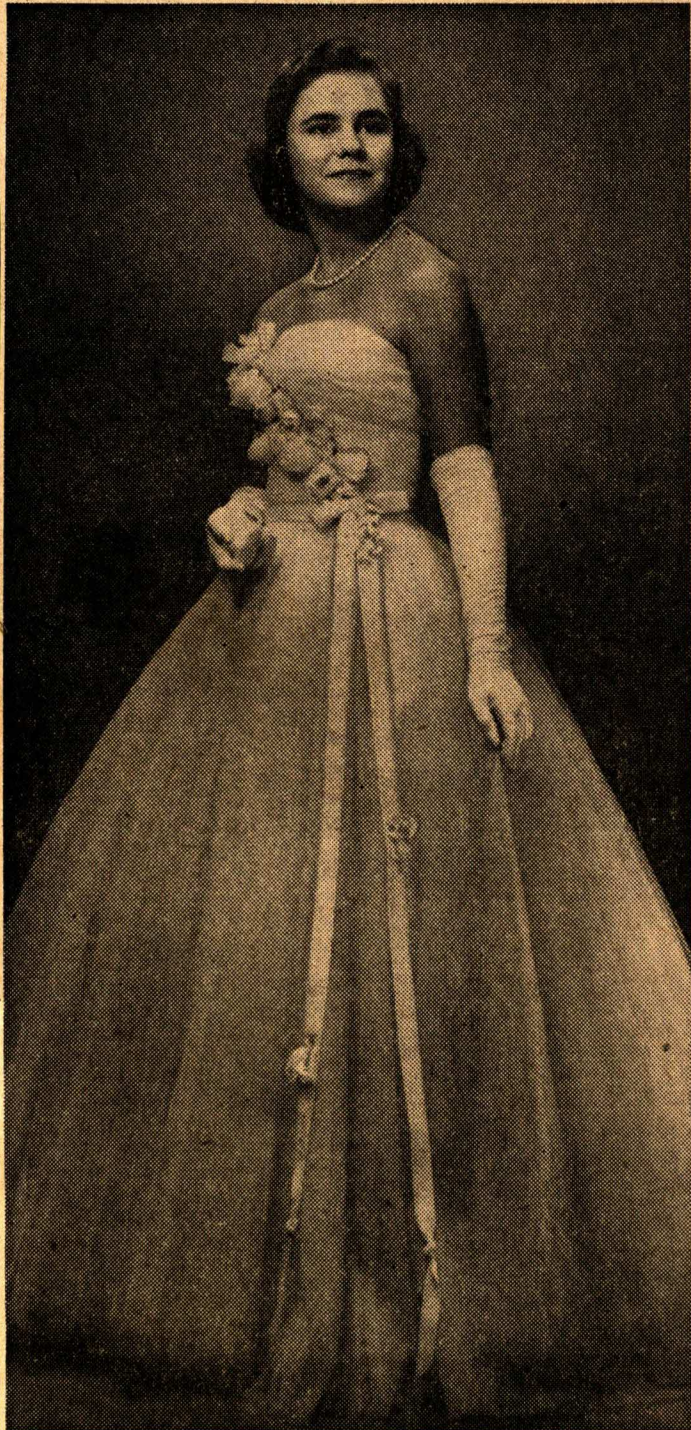

Russians Feel Sorry For U. S., Club Hears

"The Russians are a nation of disciplined people who are convinced that their way of life is the only way for the salvation of the world, and they actually feel sorry for us in the United States," George Q. McGown Jr., lawyer and World War II Navy officer, told members of the Etta Newby Club Tuesday afternoon at the November open meeting of the

group in Bewley Hall, the Woman's Club.

McGown, who was in the Pacific Theater during the war, visited Japan and Russia earlier this year.

"I'm just telling you what I believe from what I saw in the eyes of the people of Russia, and what I heard with my own ears, from different people, in different walks of life," he said.

"I can't qualify as an expert. I only spent a little more than a week, mostly in Kiev and Moscow. But I did see and hear enough to make me fearfully concerned, and disturbed by our complacency in the United States.

"The Russian people have been disciplined to communism for 40 years. They have been told that God doesn't exist and that religion is the opiate of the masses, that their government is their god and their religion."

He added: "They don't look happy, but they do appear completely disciplined and confident that theirs is the best life. They even have an enthusiasm for the communistic way of life that is much greater than the average enthusiasm we show for either our religion or our government."

"What the democratic people are going to have to do," he asserted, "is to sell the democratic way of life to the people of the world who have never known anything but dictatorships, and to stop trying to buy these people's friendship with money and gift.

"What we are going to have to do is to show our spiritual superiority to Russia, and communism, and it is going to take a great change in our way of life, a new discipline of ourselves and our families and our public life.

"Don't underestimate the hold that communism has on Russia and the other Iron Curtain countries. And don't expect a revolt of the people."

McGown told of conversations he had with Russians which indicated the people are informed, to a certain extent, of conditions in the United States. One young woman offered arguments for the advantages of state care of children over the individual family, and declared that Russia had no juvenile delinquency problem.

"A meeting such as this one," McGown said, "couldn't take place in Russia. The women would all be working."

Mrs. A. M. Pate was chairman for the afternoon and introduced the speaker. Mrs. A. M. Campbell, Newby Club president, presided.

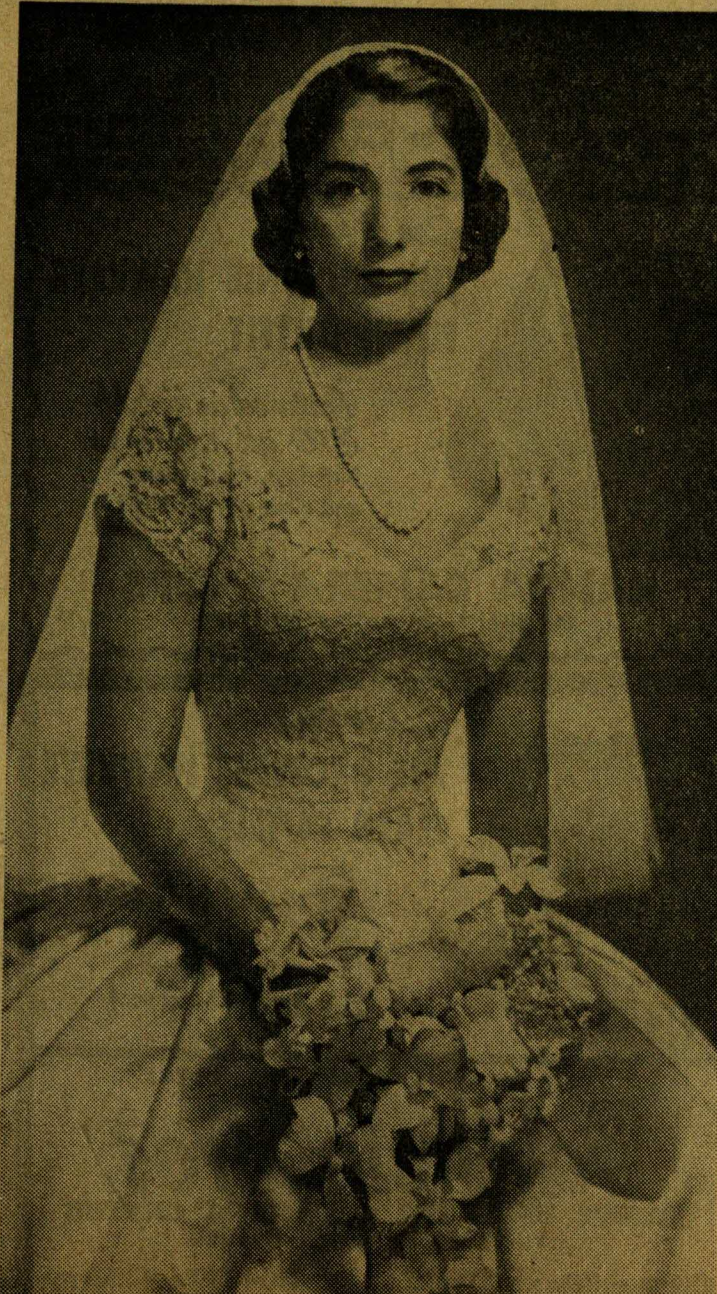

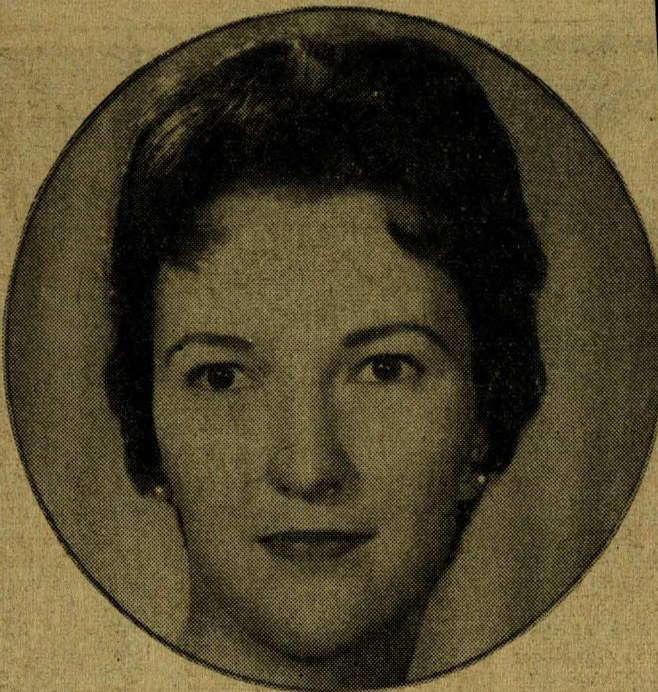

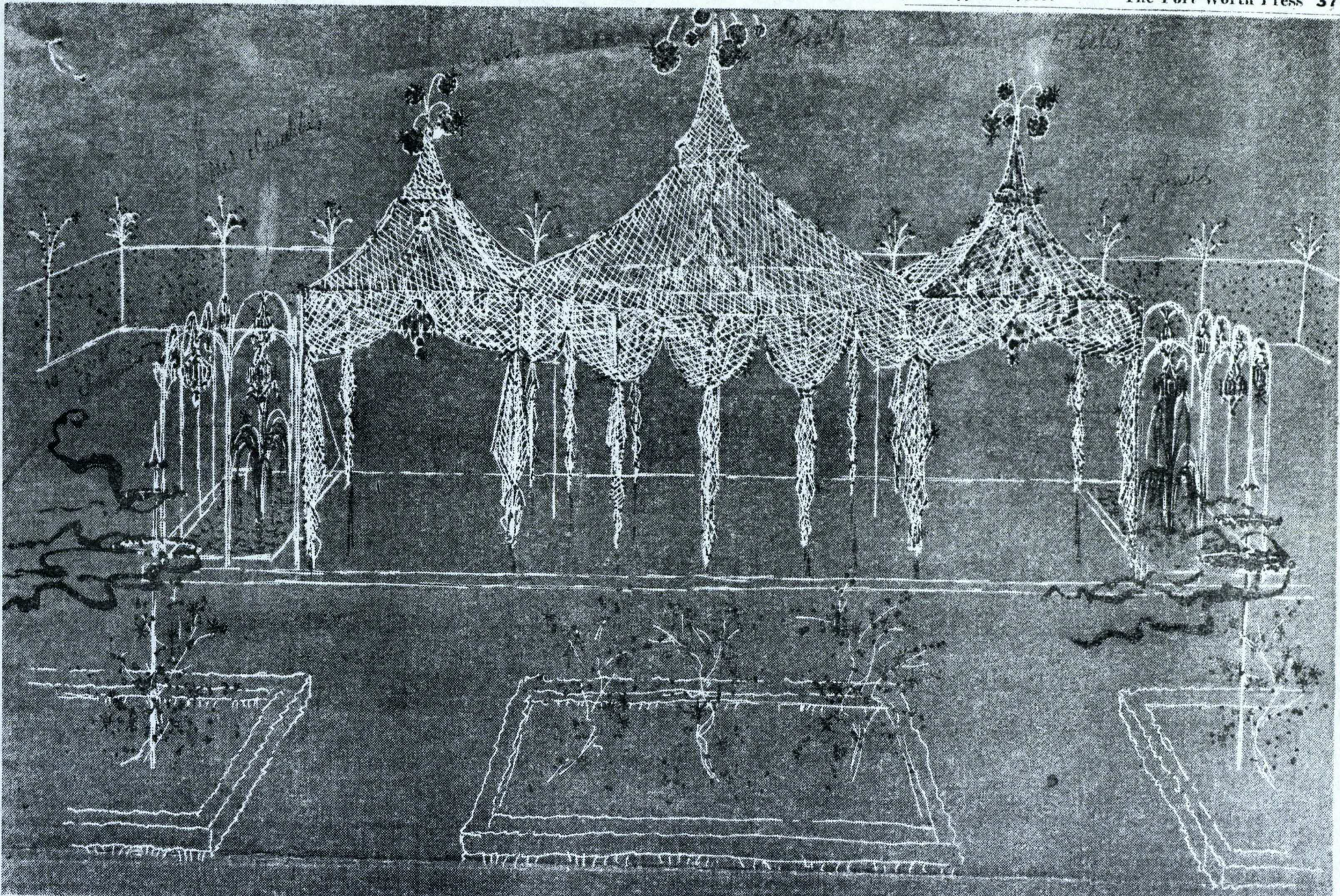

A Private Party Here: 1000 Guests Danced Atop the Swimming Pool

A thousand guests of the Robert F. Windfohrs danced atop the swimming pool at Ridglea Country Club last night.

The party for their daughter Anne Burnett Windfohr was a fitting finale to Fort Worth's most spectacular formal social season.

The swimming pool was covered with boards topped with oak parquet dance flooring. Lester Lanin of New York, Tony Almerico of New Orleans and Louis (Satchmo) Armstrong and their orchestras flew in to play for the private party.

The dance floor over the water was only one of the particulars designed by Edmund Motyka of New York for the party. Local engineers, architects, electricians and carpenters spent two days and a night setting up the decorations, some of which were built earlier to save time.

GUESTS ENTERED the party area in a flood of pink lights. They walked on silver glitter beneath twinkling starburst chandeliers the length of the outside corridor on the east side of the club house.

The ceiling was an awning of satin ribbons, alternately purple, pink, white, peacock blue and green. The wide ribbons also made a tent for tables under the wide roof overhanging outside the club's teen-age room.

Some 25,000 yards of ribbon was used.

Multi-pronged candelabra, made for an early ball of this season, were on the tables. Tall tube-like hurricanes were made and added to the candelabra so that they could be used outdoors with real candles.

Buffet tables and bars were set up at each end of the indoor ballroom.

MAIN FEATURE was the dance floor covering the pool

and the pavillion of lights which seemed to be floating in space above the dancers. There was water in the pool, and enough of it was left unfloored at each end for fountains.

Netting and twinkle lights created the three canopies of the pavillion. The center canopy was round and 40 feet in diameter. The two side ones were octagonal. Hanging from each one was a Maria Theresa crystal chandelier, measuring six feet across. Smaller crystal chandeliers were suspended over the end fountains.

All framework for the display was black so that it was blotted out by the night. Only the lights showed up. There were 80,000 of the twinkle lights, overhead and in the tall black fence put up at the back of the area, closing off the golf course.

TEN MIRROR BALLS, the kind popular in indoor ballrooms, were moving atop the canopies. Also in motion with the breeze were finials of twinkle lights along the back fence and atop the overhang roof of the club house.

Statues, those copied from the Gardens of Versailles for the Assembly Ball where Miss Windfohr made her debut, were used in gardens near the dance floor. White cherry blossoms and the twinkle lights were used in the greenery brought in for the night and in the trees and shrubs already there.

A modern Turkish corner was created in the drained children's pool. Cerese mattresses and pillows of pink and red were placed inside. An arrangement of pineapples, lemons, limes and twinkle lights was done for this area in a huge Sterling bowl.

Mirror hoops from which floated colorful banners of the ribbon were suspended by black threads from black

bamboo poles at several places, again to appear as if floating in space.

A SMALLER TYPE of light pavillion was created for the orchestra pit where the three groups of musicians took turns.

Arriving at her party at 9:30 p.m., Miss Windfohr wore a Bergdorf Goodman short formal of white and two shades of orange. Her mother's dress was yellow chiffon. Both white and dark dinner jackets were worn by the male guests.

Today the Windfohrs, of 1900 Spanish Tr., are entertaining again, not for the young debutante set, but for their own guests who came from out-of-town for last night's party. There will be a buffet supper at Shady Oaks Country Club at 5:30 p.m. Invitations referred to this party as a Lagniappe, or encore.

Dave Appolon from Las Vegas is here with his group of musicians to entertain the 175 expected guests.

MRS. WINDFOHR was Assembly president this past season. That group's party formally opened social activities here in the fall when 15 young women were presented as debutantes. The Steeplechase debts presented the following week brought the 1958-59 deb number to a record total of 21. Earlier gala affairs this season included one given by the Ralph Cumminses for their daughter Cornelia. They had dancing on stage at their Backstage Party at Will Rogers Auditorium.

Halloween, it was a black and white masked ball at River Crest the Raymond E. Bucks Sr. gave in honor of their daughter Kaye.

And the first presentation balls were the biggest in history.

Miss Windfohr Is Honored at Dance

In a setting of thousands of lights twinkling like a galaxy, Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Windfohr, 1900 Spanish Trail, honored their debutante daughter, Miss Anne Burnett Windfohr, at a formal dance Saturday at Ridgley Country Club.

Lights sparkled from the fountains at each end of the outdoor dance floor and other twinkling lights rivaled the stars in the rippling pagoda-like canopies reaching toward the sky.

Guests entered the club over a simulated milky-way of silver glitter, coming into a scene of dazzling lights which were entwined in the mesh fence across the south area of the outdoor ball, other lights winked from the light entwined mesh canopies, from crystal chandeliers hanging within the pointed canopies, and from every bush and shrub.

At intervals down the lighted edge-like fence were giant poles topped by shower-like arrangements of flowering cherry trees twinkling with lights. Against the darkness of 10 p. m., the scene seemed to be one of dazzling light hung against a backdrop of velvet.

The fountains occupied areas 16 by 50 feet at each end of the swimming pool, which was covered over, giving the effect of a floating dance floor. The tall, graceful fountains showered water and twinkling lights alike.

Each of the light-entwined canopies was surmounted by mirrored globes which in revolving threw off myriads of rainbow-hued glitters of light. Three globes adorned each lower peak, and four topped the higher spire. The mesh tops of the three fanciful Chinese-type pagoda tops were entwined with thousands of small light globes, and hanging from the canopy at each archway were light-entwined draperies, caught back in folds.

In each of the 24 archways surrounding the dance floor hung an authentic Maria Theresa crystal chandelier. From the center canopy hung a giant crystal chandelier 12 feet across, and in each of the others was an eight-foot wide crystal chandelier with prisms flashing in the light.

Music for dancing was played by Lester Lanin's orchestra from New York, by Louis Armstrong's orchestra and Tony Martin's Dixieland Jazz band from New Orleans. The music lasted until 5 a. m., each band playing from a triple-arched

stand against the south fenced area. In the arches hung porcupine balls flashing with dozens of tiny electric globes, while other lights twinkled in the archways and overhead.

At intervals around the pool were tall bamboo poles encircled by three mirrored hoops to which were attached rosettes of satin ribbons in bright pink, pale pink, royal blue and avocado green and lemon yellow, with the satin streamers blowing in the breeze. Garden areas around the dance floor were accented by garden statuary, including a pair of Versailles feminine figures. The areas were filled with blooming shrubs and hedges, all lighted by concealed miniature globes. In an adjoining sunken area was a towering arrangement of tropical fruits, lemons, limes, oranges and pineapples, all lighted with twinkling globes. On top was a tall pineapple candelabra with burning tapers. Surrounding the fruit arrangement were colorful cushions and pads making it a "sit and watch" area.

The loggia, on the south side of the club, was arranged with small tables for four, each covered with a cerise damask cloth. The canopy overhead was formed of satin ribbons in tropical colors, the ribbons extending down the walls to the floor, covering the walls completely with the bright streamers.

The same ribbon canopy effect was used in the entrance to the ball with myriads of twinkling lights flashing in the ceiling of the corridor of ribbon.

One thousand guests attended the ball. Mrs. Windfohr wore a yellow chiffon gown while receiving the guests and her daughter wore a white peau de soie gown with a flowing skirt, and a bodice formed of two shades of orange. Miss Windfohr was escorted by Frank Coates Jr. of Houston.

The Windfohrs' house guests were Richard Warren of New York, Misses Nina Perltz, Elizabeth Winfrey and Bess Tooke, all of Houston.

At midnight, buffet services were arranged on long tables at each end of the loggia. The pineapple candelabra with each slim candle in a specially made hurricane globe were used on all of the small tables and also on the long serving tables.

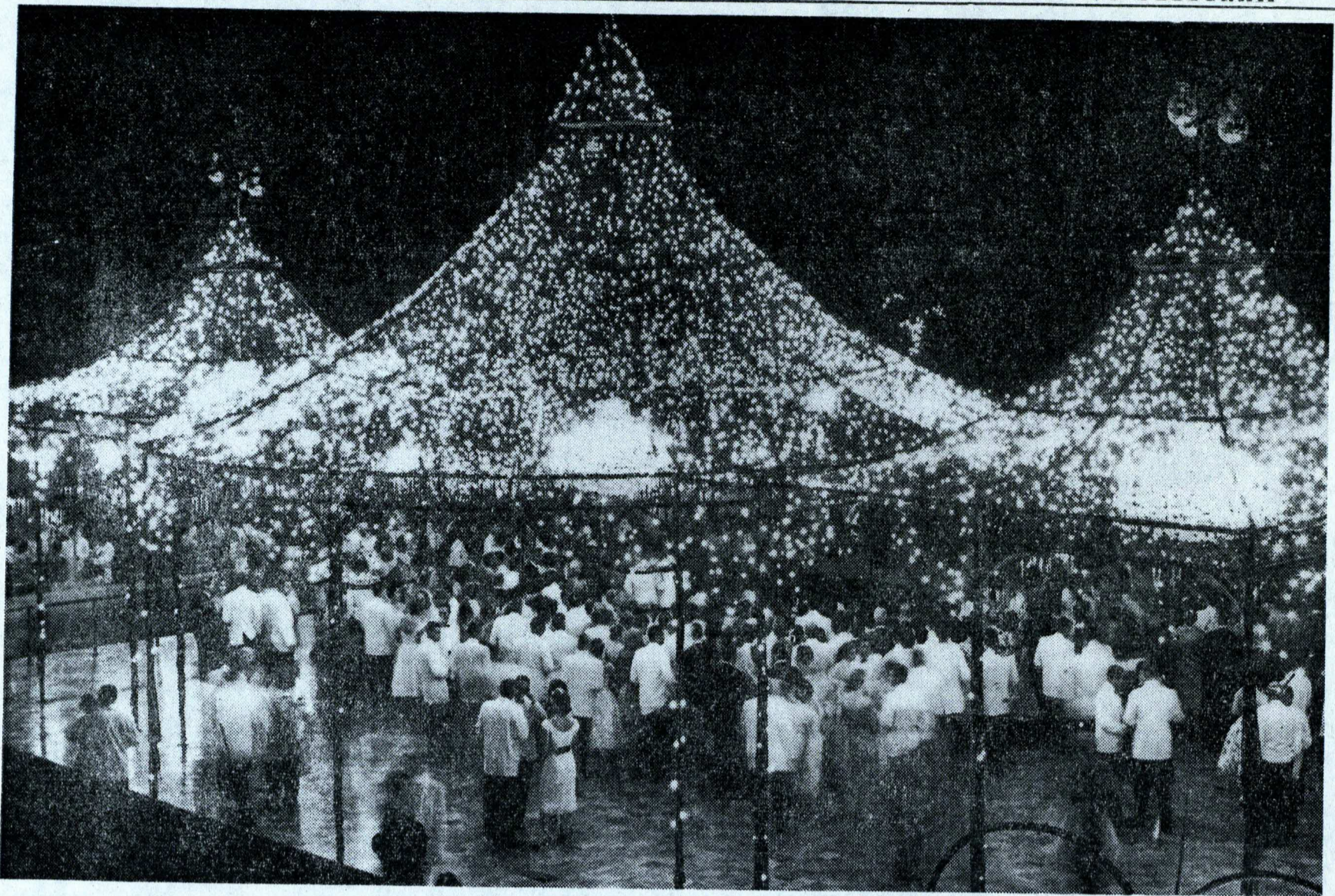
At 4 a. m., bright-painted carts laden with hamburgers, coffee and cold drinks were pushed onto the terrace for the young people to have snacks by the early dawning.
