A series of matters were enacted more important than any since the original formation of a State Chapter in 1932 in Dallas. All actions taken and changes made were well thought out and with view of permanency and progress.

Business Sorority Reassembles



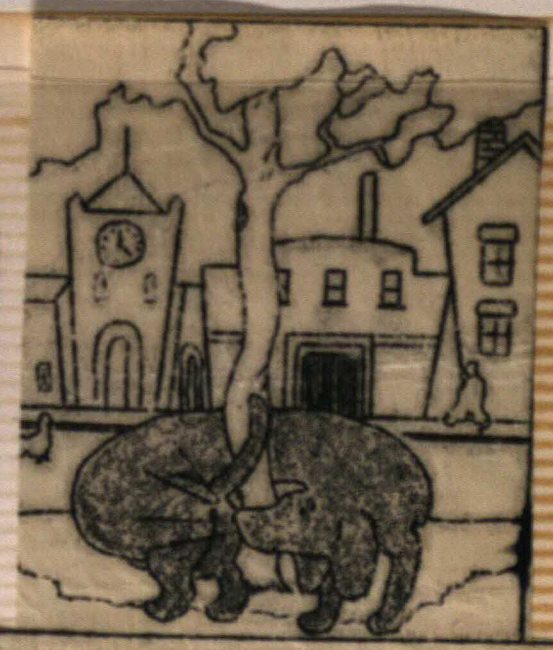

Sorority Will Form Guild Council

Organization of a city council of the University Guild will be perfected this week by three chapters of Pi Omicron Sorority. These chapters, Eta-Iota, Zeta and Texas Tau, have their membership from women in business and the professions, and hold evening meetings at the Worth Hotel. A fourth chapter, the Theta, is composed of club women, and holds afternoon meetings at the Woman's Club.

The council will make plans for continuing the activity of the chapters after the regulation three-year course of study, arranged by the National University Guild board, is completed. All the Fort Worth chapters with the exception of Texas Tau will finish the course next season. The last named was organized this Spring. In addition to the cultural program a plan of service activity also is to be considered. Some of the chapters already have made contributions to social service projects.

The council will be composed of the chapter presidents and two representatives from each group. These are: Eta-Iota, Mrs. Arnold Sutton, president; Miss Westyl Splawn and Mrs. Erschel Records; Zeta, Miss Elodie Maguire, president; Misses Gladys M. Kendall and Mary Bess Smith; Texas Tau, Miss Carolyn Cully, president; Miss Virginia Godbey and Mrs. Bonnie Conner.

Miss Splawn is a member of the state executive committee of the University Guild. All local chapters are affiliated with the state and the national organizations, which hold annual meetings. National headquarters are in Atlanta, Ga., and Miss Ada Booth of that city is national president of the Pi Omicron Sorority. Dr. John Houston Finley, former president of New York State University, and the College of the City of New York, who has been a lecturer at the Sorbonne, is editor of the University Guild library of classics, and director of the national program. Mr. E. R. Hirt, also of Atlanta, is president of the guild.

Miss Lide Sprazins is director of the study for the Eta-Iota, Zeta and Theta Chapters. Mrs. Ernest May is director for the Texas Tau Chapter. The latter group follows the lecture form of programs, the other three carrying out member participation programs. Classic literature, with its historical background, forms the subject of the original three-year study course.

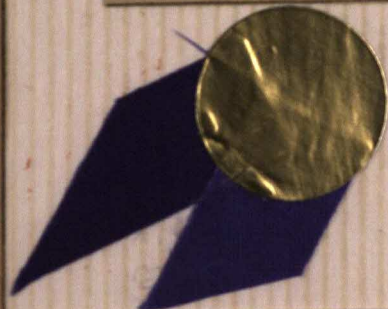
Sorority Furnishes Room In Hospital Polio Ward

Members of Mu chapter, Phi Eta national sorority, Saturday furnished a room in the polio ward of City-County Hospital. The 60 women raised about

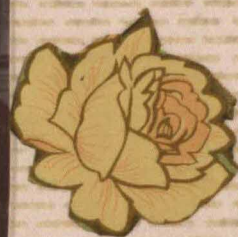
\$220 as their annual social service project.
