

N ORDER to explain the Heraldic description or blazonry as it is technically called, of The Armorial Bearings of The Pi Omicron Sorority, it should be first made quite clear that, although all such achievements originally had their roots in the growth of a mediaeval military aristocracy, they have developed quite a different symbolism through the ages. Even as words change or become altered with usage and time, so the Armorial Bearings have changed and now are designed to assume a peaceful aspect which their originators never dreamed of. In fact, the spirit of heraldry has become such an integral part of our literature and art that its usage is in good taste and above reproach.

¶ Shakespeare, Spencer, Scott, Longfellow, Tennyson, Pope, Milton, and for that matter, practically all of the classic authors make such frequent allusions to heraldry as to make it almost necessary for a cultured person to be familiar with heraldic terms.

¶ In describing a coat of arms, the color of the shield is mentioned first. In this case, azure, or blue, is used. Blue is the traditional color of friendship, and it is here employed to exemplify that only on the broad basis of the spirit of friendship and purposive co-operation does the attainment of one's ideals become practical.

¶ On the escutcheon, or shield, are placed ordinaries and charges. Heraldically speaking the escutcheon is charged with various symbols. The ordinary in this case is the bend and it is shown here in or, or gold.

The bend had its origin, history tells us, in being used as the representation of a scaling ladder, such as was utilized by the military forces to storm the walls of some besieged mediaeval castle. And, inasmuch as such ladders were used as a means of ascending or rising, the bend is here used as a symbol of aspiration, like a ray of golden light that draws the eye upward toward noble attainments. In the escutcheon of The Pi Omicron insignia, the bend typifies the worthy aspirations of our membership to attain a greater share in the beauties of cultural education.

¶ The billets are the rectangular forms on either side of the bend. They stand for books which are the common media for the dissemination of knowledge. The first in sinister chief, i. e. right top of shield facing the reader stands for Cultural Knowledge, and is debruised with the Greek letter Pi. This is the initial letter of the Greek word Πανεπιστημιακὸς pronounced Păn-ĕpĭstǐ-mi-a-kŏs', defined as follows:

Παν- —all, every, integral επιστημι-—science, knowledge ακὸς —adjective ending.

¶ The billet in the dexter base i.e., left lower portion of shield facing the reader, represents Basic Training and is debruised with the Greek letter Omicron, the initial of the Greek word, ^ΔΟμιλος pronounced Ō-mĕ-lŏss, defining a group, a band, a guild. Together, the words stand for the name of our sorority, Pi Omicron.

Above the escutcheon is the torse, or crest wreath. This device is a heritage of mediaeval times. Originally it was known as the ladies' colors, being a twisted wreath of ribbon presented to a knight by his lady as he took her leave to enter on some quest or crusade. The torse has traditionally been incorporated in all coats of arms and is conventionally represented in profile by six small divisions alternating the principal metal and color of the shield.

THROUGH the acceptance of your application by the Membership Committee, as attested in your Certificate of Membership, you are now a member of Pi Omicron, a National Sorority.

The sole object of the sorority is to prepare its members so that they may attain a greater share in benefits of Cultural and Liberal

Pi Omicron has a national membership of intelligent and progressive women among those in business and society, who are recognizing that education should properly be extended into adult life

There is an increasing general demand for education in some form or other; and everywhere in all classes of society, the interest in acquiring better knowledge is apparent. Until recently, people thought of education as something for children: something which they either got or missed in their early years and something which they generally forgot in their mature years. To the average person education was a matter of fond memories or of unpleasant associations with teachers, schoolhouses and experiences of childhood. The

"highly" educated person was the exception in the community, and discussions of the philosophy of higher education did not appeal to a wide public interest.

Now, however, higher branches of learning are being pursued by numbers of people outside of our colleges and universities. Something very significant is happening. Perhaps at no time since the Thirteenth Century has a desire for higher education so nearly approached a mass movement.

It is sought, to make of adult education through the Pi Omicron Sorority in its national movement, something which will broaden the interest and sympathies of people—regardless of their daily occupation—or along with it.

To lift one's thought out of the monotony and drudgery which are the common lot; to free the mind from servitude and herd opinion; to train habits of judgment and of appreciation of values; to temper passion with wisdom; to dispel prejudice by better knowledge of self will advance one in the achievement of civilization,—this is the mission of Pi Omicron.

It is hoped in this educational movement that those members of Pi Omicron will take the initiative in banding themselves together as active chapter units in the National Sorority.

Origin

of Sorority

American colleges and universities are crowded, and many students are, each year, turned away. Vast and increasing numbers are register-

ing annually for courses outside of our educational institutions. The desire for adult education is also shown by the increasing number of lecture and extension courses, people's colleges, and other centers of public discussions.

The Pi Omicron Sorority is the outgrowth of this adult educational movement.

Far seeing educators, members of the faculties of our outstanding universities, knowing that less than two per cent of the citizens of the United States have the opportunity of obtaining higher educational training, and that less than one per cent are fortunate enough to graduate from our universities, have collaborated in preparing the text material for The University Guild, and in this manner are brought the fruits of a college education to the members of Pi Omicron.

Plan of Sorority

The plan of the Sorority lends itself quickly to group study or chapter work. Most women who are interviewed by our field secretaries are already familiar with the benefits of Club association, Civic, or otherwise, and by their activities, a civic interest has been born to help in the process of bringing greater enjoyment to others.

It is not surprising, therefore, that this national educational movement has met with such instant approval and cooperation. Public spirited women have been willing to lend their aid in assuming the initiative among their associates to form chapter units of the National Sorority for the benefit of all. With this spirit of constructiveness, we are

anxious to cooperate. Each Staff Secretary will gladly lend her efforts in the formation of a chapter by soliciting members for the required quota of charter members among your friends, and will help in the process of organization. And the Staff Secretary will also help by introducing the prospective charter members one to another, and assisting at the opening assembly of the chapter by acquainting all present with the plan of chapter procedure.

At the open assembly, those who are to constitute charter members elect their administrative officers, and sign the charter, which will be presented by the Staff Secretary, thereby establishing a local chapter of the National Sorority.

Method of Enrollment

Enrollment

Entrance into Pi Omicron is accomplished by application through authorized Staff Secretaries of The University Guild, who are located in all the principal cities of the United States.

The entire cost including the text material is \$96.00. The enrollment fee is \$10.00 accompanying the application, and membership dues are \$6.00 per month until the membership has been paid in full. Member will receive her sorority pin when one-third of membership price has been paid.

Duties of The sorority relies partially for its expansion on the cooperation of its members in suggesting worthy and interested friends, and in encouraging

them to enter the sorority. The desire on the part of each member in this direction will, of course, be greatly stimulated through the benefits they themselves derive from such membership.

It is, therefore, assumed that all members of the National Sorority shall make a sincere effort in applying themselves to the study of the text material, and because they have the opportunity to secure benefits of chapter work to lend to their chapter every cooperation by regular attendance and active participation in the chapter program.

Privileges of Members while much benefit will accrue from the chapter program and study of the text in active chapter work, there is still another privilege extended through the service department at the Office of Administration in Atlanta, Georgia.

The Tutorial Board will gladly recommend supplementary material connected with any of the subjects, and answer all questions pertaining to the study of the course, and, in general, will help in every way possible each member of the Sorority.

The membership card of identification offers still another privilege. Even though a member is located in a small center unable to support an active chapter, she still has the benefit of her membership in the National Sorority. She may obtain all of the material connected with The University Guild educational plan at no additional expense, and by virtue of her membership card visit National chapter meetings wherever located,

and become an active member of such body through action of the local chapter.

Membership in Pi Omicron does not restrict one to any local chapter, but is national in its privileges.

National The University Guild program is furnished each member following her enrollment in the National Sorority so she may have the benefits of the Tutorial Notes and Tutorial Assignments which will greatly enhance the value of the text material.

With a desire to further cooperate with the sorority, where members have banded themselves together in chapter work, there has been included the national constitution, by-laws and parliamentary usage, for the organization and the administration of such chapter.

Believing that an added benefit beyond those already mentioned will accrue to each member of Pi Omicron whether or not she be active in chapter work, there has been incorporated in the program a practical course on the Art of Public Speaking.

To speak well, one needs—in addition to the indispensable something to say—complete naturalness in saying it.

The elimination of self-consciousness—developing the power of concentration—the avoidance of

monotony—and the ways of interesting an audience—are only a few of the important subjects dealt with.

Development of poise and power of expression through the helpfulness of this course will add greatly to the benefits a member may secure in chapter work.

Ideals of Sorority

Adult education is a way of living which should be open to all for its own sake, but it is not surprising that it is misconstrued, for it was once thought that ignorance was an innocent thing, a sort of spiritual vacuum, passively waiting to be filled with precious truths.

Except in children, ignorance is by no means an innocent thing. It is a very active element in human life. Each of us who strive to educate ourselves—and no one can educate us—must win a certain victory over our own nature. We must learn to smile at our dear idols, analyze our every prejudice, scrap, if necessary, our fondest and most consoling belief and take our chances with the truth.

This is an obvious fact now realized by all modern and progressive women in whatever sphere, whether she be in business, the professions or has chosen the domestic side of life as her career. Vocational and professional education alone does not necessarily make for a full and well rounded life—education then becomes more than just training. The educated woman is one who

Summer is here and with it comes plans for vacations—


The first in our Chapter to carry out her plans, is Mrs. Van Tuyl, who left Saturday, May 31st for Del Rio and into Mexico.

-THE ROAD AHEAD-


As the old year comes to a close and we stand at the threshold of the new, it is but natural that we pause to look back over the read that we have traveled. The way has not been without its rough spots.

To enjoy the warmth of a happy fireside - to have friends and be a friend, and to plan, work, accomplish, sacrifice and serve -- that is to live!












Concepcion Purisima, better known as the first mission, one of five in the San Antonio district built by Spanish padres in 1731. All are in a condition of "beautiful ruins." The Alamo, in the heart of the city, surrounded by skyscrapers, is considered by most people of the greatest interest, but to Mr. Polley the missions south of the city, surrounded by trees and walls and Mexican cabins, are the most picturesque. The mission Concepcion Purisima is the best preserved and is the only one with twin towers. The doorway is a beautiful piece of hand carving in soft stone and in its state of partial ruin is exceptionally interesting. While the design of these old buildings was evolved by the padres in charge of the work, and the money for their construction was furnished mainly by the king of Spain, the actual labor was done by the Indians. It is said that the mortar used in the construction of this building was mixed with pure milk from the herds of cows and goats of the Indian followers. In making repairs to the church some years ago the mortar was found to be harder than the stones its binds together. Services still are held in the chapel.




MISS LIDE SPRAGINS.




What to see and how to visit San Jacinto

San Jacinto Battlegrounds, which is now a state park of over 500 acres, and which was the scene of the decisive battle between the Texan and Mexican armies which won independ-. ence for Texas, lies 22 miles from Houston, south and east on the LaPorte Road. A visit to South Texas would not be complete without a trip to San Jacinto, where this beautiful park and the world-famous memorial monument are situated.

Many historical markers and monuments are scattered throughout the grounds marking spots of skirmishes, various places of historical interest and the last resting places of noted Texans.

From the San Jacinto Battlegrounds one gets a beautiful view of the Houston Ship Channel, and, generally, several large ocean-going ships on their way to or from the seven seas of the world can be seen.

San Jacinto Battle Grounds A State Park of Beauty

Situated 22 miles from Houston, Texas, on a four lane, concrete highway

and has a spread of 364 feet in each direction. The other rises nine feet and has a spread of 244 feet.

THE SAN JACINTO MUSEUM OF HISTORY

The San Jacinto Museum of History Association, a patriotic organization supported by private subscription, has established one of the great historical museums of the United States in the five spacious rooms at the base of the Monument. This Association has been given custody of the entire Monument by legislative act.

The main entrance to the Monument and Museum leads to the Hall of Honor, forty-four feet by forty-five feet, which has four niches for statuary. On either side of this hall are the two main museum rooms, each 36 by 103 feet. It has been tentatively decided to use the room to the right or south side for exhibition of material covering the period of Spanish and Mexican rule over Texas, and the room on the north side for the period of Anglo-American domination.

At the rear of the base building is an amphitheatre seating more than 5000. On the opposite side is a lagoon wherein the shaft will be mirrored from base to tip.

Through the Hall of Honor a large entrance lobby leads to an elevator which whisks visitors up through the shaft to the observation tower.

The shaft is 47 feet square at the base and tapers to 30 feet at the top. Its total weight is 70,300,000 pounds.

Mural paintings, the subjects of which have not yet been definitely decided upon, will adorn the plastered portions above the marble finish, in the museum of historical relics.

The cost of the project, not including the statuary, paintings, and exhibits, has run well over a million dollars. This cost is borne equally by the state, the Public Works Administration, the Works Progress Administration, and the Federal Government, through a direct grant.

A glistening shaft, 12 feet lottier than the famous Washington Monument, today stands on the old battlefield of San Jacinto, about 20 miles from Houston, where in 1836 General Sam Houston and his band of some 800 tattered patriots put to rout Santa Anna's Mexican army of twice the strength, lifting from Texas the voke of Mexican oppression—assuring the complete independence of the Lone Star State, and securing for the United States nearly one-third of its land area.

The San Jacinto Memorial towers 567 feet above the hallowed soil in this state park. The memorial is constructed of reinforced concrete faced with variegated golden buff Texas limestone quarried near Austin, the state capital. Polished limestone is of shell formation and takes a high polish, which makes it appear quite similar to travertine marble.

An idea of the immense size of this monument may be gained from a scrutiny of the huge star on its apex. This star is 35 feet high and as many feet in breadth, and weighs 220 tons. Yet, from the ground it appears to be a mere plaything.

The foundation of this memorial was built to last through the centuries. In it are 120 carloads of gravel, 90 carloads of sand, 25 carloads of cement, and 11 carloads of steel. It is 124 feet square, 36 feet high and 15 feet thick.

The base has two broad approach terraces. One rises six feet

The Battle

The Battle of San Jacinto, though lasting but eighteen minutes on April 21, 1836, is conceded to be the sixteenth most decisive conflict in the world's history.

Judge Clarence R. Wharton has impressively written of this angle in his history, "The Republic of Texas." In his descrip-

tion of the battle he states in part:

"As they fronted each other this day, they were in a struggle for the boundary line of distinct civilizations. Upon the discovery of the Americans, the Spaniard by his explorations and bloody conquests had fastened his domination, his language, his laws on all South America, and at one time his claims covered more than half of North America.

'Even after the Spaniard cession of Louisiana to France, and the relinquishment of Florida to the United States, Spain held Mexico, and it included Texas and the vast country to the northwest to the fortysecond parallel upon the Pacific. In North America, England had become the dominant power, and here on this April day came the clash of Latin with Saxon sov-

ereignty. Sam Houston, Sidney Sherman, Tom Rusk, Edward Burleson, Lamar, John Wharton and hundreds bearing English names and of English ancestry, were opposed to Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, Juan Nepomuceno Almonte, Pedro Delgado, and others bearing high-sound-

ing Spanish names.

The ancestors of these combatants had fought each other when the Spanish Armada sailed into northern seas to work the destruction of England. And now they

Besides being entertaining and uplifting, these two reviews came under the heading of "paid" reviews and added a tidy sum to our treasury.
