REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING AND ON COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

Honorable County Judge and Commissioners Tarrant County, Texas

We have audited the financial statements of Tarrant County (the County) as of and for the year ended September 30, 2006, and have issued our report thereon dated January 26, 2007. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the County's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements caused by error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses.

REPORT ON COMPLIANCE WITH REQUIREMENTS APPLICABLE TO EACH MAJOR PROGRAM AND ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER COMPLIANCE IN ACCORDANCE WITH OMB CIRCULAR A-133

Compliance

We have audited the compliance of Tarrant County (the County) with the types of compliance requirements described in the U. S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) *Circular A-133 Compliance Supplement and State of Texas Uniform Grant Management Standards (UGMS)* that are applicable to each of its major federal and state programs for the year ended September 30, 2006. The County's major federal and state programs are identified in the summary of auditor's results section of the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. Compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants applicable to each of its major federal and state programs is the responsibility of the County's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the County's compliance based on our audit.

We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and OMB Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations and UGMS*. Those standards and OMB Circular A-133 require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal or state program occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about the County's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion. Our audit does not provide a legal determination of the County's compliance with those requirements.

In our opinion, the County complied, in all material respects, with the requirements referred to above that are applicable to each of its major federal and state programs for the year ended September 30, 2006. However, the results of our auditing procedures disclosed instances of noncompliance with those requirements, which are required to be reported in accordance with OMB Circular A-133 and UGMS and which are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as item 2006-01.

Corrective Action Plan Findings and Questioned Costs For the Year Ended September 30, 2006

Reference Number 2006-01 (Department of State Health Services - HIV/State Services)

Criteria: A signed copy of a Confidentiality Agreement, Diagnosis Letter, Proof of Income, Proof of Residency, Bill of Rights, Acknowledgement of Receipt of Grievance Rights, Referral Letter, Authorization for Release of Confidential Information and ARIES consent form must be easily accessible in each client file, as mandated by the Texas Department of State Health Services' HIV and STD Program Operating Procedures and Standards.

Condition: The County's client files were missing required documentation.

Effect: The County may provide assistance to ineligible individuals and the agency may be at risk for potential lawsuits regarding the release of confidential information without the appropriate documentation.

Cause: The HIV administrative agency for the County did not inform the subcontractors that the required documentation must be maintained for each individual receiving program benefits.

Recommendation: The County's HIV administrative agency should inform all subcontractors of the required documentation that should be maintained in their client files.

Response: Tarrant County Public Health's HIV Administrative Agency (AA) discovered in November 2006 that the guidance from the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) regarding Client Chart Organization differed from the requirements being monitored by the AA at HIV subcontracting service provider agencies.

The AA began working on policies that would ensure full compliance with DSHS requirements, and on February 8, 2007 distributed to the Service Delivery Agencies Council (SDAC) a draft policy for Client Chart Organization and Content with the notice that the policy would be enforced beginning March 1, 2007. To ensure adequacy, the policies were submitted to SDAC members via e-mail on February 22, 2007 for a 30-day comment period, which expired on March 22, 2007. SDAC members were also given a reminder at their March 8, 2007 meeting that there were two weeks remaining to submit their comments.

The policies underwent minor revisions following the 30-day comment period and were re-distributed to agencies via e-mail on April 9, 2007. Subcontracting agencies were also notified at this time that graduated monitoring of client charts would begin immediately, with a scheduled percentage of chart completion set for each quarter throughout the fiscal year. At each audit, 100% of new clients after March 1, 2007 are to have fully-compliant chart documentation. Clients registered prior to March 1, 2007 must have all required documentation on the following schedule: 25% of charts complete by 5/31/2007; 50% of charts complete by 8/31/2007; 75% of charts complete by 11/30/2007; and 100% of all charts complete by 2/28/2008.

2. COMMODITIES

The County receives assistance in the form of vaccines from the Department of Health under Program CFDA 93.268. The amount expended from those vaccines during the year ended September 30, 2006 was \$2,813,406 and is included in the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal and State Awards.
