## Hear the Beep Where You Sleep. Every Bedroom Needs a Working Smoke Alarm!

Location matters when it comes to your smoke alarm. That's the message behind this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Hear the Beep Where You Sleep. Every Bedroom Needs a Working Smoke Alarm!"

Along with firefighters and safety advocates nationwide, the Tarrant County Fire Marshal's Office is joining forces with the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) during Fire Prevention Week, October 4-10, to remind local residents about the importance of having working smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement.

"In a fire, seconds count," said Tarrant County Fire Marshal Randy Reno. "Half of home fire deaths result from fires reported at night between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m., when most people are asleep. Home smoke alarms can alert people to a fire before it spreads, giving everyone enough time to get out."

According to the latest NFPA research, working smoke alarms cut the chance of dying in a fire in half. Meanwhile, three out of five fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign includes the following smoke alarm messages:

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement.
- Interconnect all smoke alarms throughout the home. This way, when one sounds, they all do.
- Test alarms at least monthly by pushing the test button.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or sooner if they don't respond properly.
- Make sure everyone in the home knows the sound of the smoke alarm and understands what to do when they hear it.
- If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside. Go to your outside meeting place.
- Call the fire department from outside the home.

## You Can Stop the Flu

Even healthy people can get the flu, and it can be serious. The flu shot offers protection for you and those around you. Everyone six months and older should get a flu shot. The flu vaccine is plentiful this year and there are numerous places in Tarrant County to get a flu shot.

After getting a flu shot, there are a several other prevention measures to use:

- Keep yourself healthy by eating right and getting enough rest and exercise.
- If you are sick, stay at home and don't go to work, school or other places where germs can be spread to others.
- In crowded areas and at home, keep your distance from people who are sick, and don't get close to them if you are not well.
- Keep your hands away from your eyes, nose and mouth.

Finally, there are two common-sense measures to practice year-round:

- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing. It may prevent those around you from getting sick.
- Wash your hands often to help protect yourself from germs and to reduce their spread.

Flu season in Texas usually runs from October to March with the majority of cases occurring in January and February.
