

STUDENT'S RECORD BOOK

This book contains a duplicate of the student's record as it is in the Registrar's office. The book is issued to the student at the close of his first year. The same book is used until he graduates.

No one, except members of the Registrar's staff, may make entries in it, only as provided on the last page.

How to Use It

1. Preserve it. If lost a new one will cost you one dollar.
2. It must be presented each time you register for a new semester.
3. When consulting teachers about courses.
4. Use the last page for keeping a record of your majors, minors, and required work.
5. Leave at the Registrar's office during the week of final examinations each semester, or when you drop out of school. It will be returned to you when your grades are recorded.

REPORTS are mailed to parents three times each session. This book will be the spring semester's report.

TRANSCRIPT. This book is not a transcript. An official transcript will be sent directly to any other school, but not to the student himself, on request. One transcript is furnished free. Each additional one will cost one dollar. No transcript will be issued if the student is in arrears in the Business Office or the Library.

Condensed Information Every Student Should Know

A course cannot be dropped unless permission is given through the Registrar's office. Just quitting a course means a failure and also demerits.

An absence brings a zero grade. If it be excused the work may be made up to the student's average grade. Ten absences in one semester means a failure. No class cuts are recognized. The reason for an absence should be reported to the teacher.

Chapel absences operate to a loss of semester hour credits.

A study hall is provided for those who fail to do good work; and for those who frequently loiter on the campus or in the halls.

REQUIRED FOR GRADUATION: 120 semester hours, and 300 points. A semester hour is one hour of recitation per week for eighteen weeks. Point values are assigned to grades as follows: A+, 5 for each semester hour; A, 4; B+, 3; B, 2; C, 1. For example: "Eng. 11, 6 semester hours, grade A, gets 6 times 4, 24 points." To get your average grade, or index, divide the total number of points by the total number of hours.

GRADES—A+, rarely excellent, perfect application.

A, excellent, thorough application.

B+, good, but lacking finish or depth.

B, below good average.

C, barely passing.

D, conditioned, incomplete. (Must be completed within 30 days.)

E, failure. If at end of a semester the course must be dropped.

The student must make an average grade of B+ in 12 hours after the first 12, in his major, and in 12 after the first 6 in his first minor.

AMOUNT OF WORK. The normal amount of work a student should carry is 15 or 16 hours. Students with high grades may be permitted to carry more up to a maximum of 18; but if grades fall below 3.75, credit for the course is discounted. (See catalog.)

Duncan to China

Dr. Robert M. Duncan, assistant professor in government, will spend the next three years in Peiping, China, as professor of political science in Yenching University. Dr. Duncan will work through the Princeton-Yenching School of Public Affairs, which is associated with the Princeton University School of Public and International Affairs.

Dr. Duncan has been a member of the T. C. U. faculty for the past two years. He received his Ph. D. degree from Princeton in 1928. He and Mrs. Duncan plan to leave the United States about July 1, going to the Orient by way of France, Italy, the Suez Canal, and around the southern coast of India.

Professor Duncan has made a distinct contribution to T. C. U. in his scholarly work here, and his withdrawal from the University faculty is viewed with great regret by his colleagues and his students. His presence at Peiping will stimulate local interest in the important educational movements going on in China.







Hoover's Wires Precede


Harper Lincecum Tells How White House Is Served.

President Hoover is in almost instantaneous communication with every city of any importance in the United States, according to Harper Lincecum, telegraph operator and student at T. C. U. He is surrounded by a network of telegraph wires which carry information to and from the entire world, and are at his service twenty-four hours of the day.

The President can command instant service over approximately 1,852,069 miles of telegraph wires and has immediate communication with more than 27,000 telegraph offices in cities and towns from coast to coast.

The Western Union Company maintains a special call board for the White House and government business. When the President has anything to send two lamps flash on at the call board in the Western Union office and a special operator, of which there is always one on duty, informs wire chief, then takes the message. By the time the message is received the wires connecting with the town to which the message is going have been wired that there is to be a message from the President and they are waiting expectantly. 
