Emergency Management Coordinator

I am the new Emergency Management Coordinator for Tarrant County. My job is to work with the county departments and the cities within the county to prevent, prepare for, respond to and recover from emergencies and disasters.

My emergency management career began back in the early 1970's as a member of the Palo Pinto County Civil Defense in Mineral Wells. After graduating from TCU (go Frogs!), I began my law enforcement career as a Police Officer for the City of Grapevine in 1979. While at the City, I served as an Officer and the City's Emergency Management Coordinator while also completing a second undergraduate degree in Emergency

Administration and Planning from UNT.

In 1991, I left Grapevine and went to work for DFW Airport Department of Public Safety. During my career at DFW, I had the privilege of serving as a Police Officer, Firefighter, Paramedic, and Emergency Management Coordinator. In addition to my work duties at the airport, I returned to school to become a licensed Registered Nurse and worked at several hospitals in the northern portions of Tarrant County. I also returned to school to receive an MPA degree from UNT. After a 25-year career, I retired from DFW Airport in 2016.

In late August of 2016, I was hired as the Tarrant County Emergency Management Coordinator. I have the honor of working with many great folks in the county and surrounding communities and the North Texas Region. I am especially blessed to have a great staff (William Wessel and Matt Honza) to work with on a

day-to-day basis. Our main focus is to help coordinate activities and to serve as the County liaisons to local, state and federal agencies while promoting all-hazard preparedness and readiness initiatives to the citizens of Tarrant County.

Nutrition Education That Works!



Since its inception in 1969, the Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) has grown in stature and continues to shine brightly in leading to improved family diets and nutritional well-being. Operating in every state and U.S. territory, the program reaches some half-million families annually.



In Texas, EFNEP is administered by Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in 11 counties to reach limited-resource families who are at the greatest risk to suffer from hunger and are disproportionately affected by poor

health. Through effective collaborative work with local agency partners in Tarrant County, our EFNEP faculty of four delivers research-based information and education year-round to clients in community-based settings, including Metroplex churches and school classrooms. Utilizing a hands-on learning approach helps participants make simple changes in eating behaviors so that over time, healthy choices become sustained



healthy habits. A series of interactive lessons are facilitated in English and Spanish to offer adults and youth practical tips on stretching food dollars, improving eating habits, increasing physical activity and handling food safely in the home as participants also learn to prepare nutritious, low-cost recipes.

Over time, these improvements translate into reduced incidences of disease and lower health care costs. Studies have shown that for every \$1 spent on EFNEP, \$10 was estimated to be saved on health care costs and \$2 saved in food costs by participants. For Tarrant County, this is \$2.9 million per year in estimated health care cost savings and \$580,000 in food costs.

Jet Age Pittsburgh Coatings Protect Tunnel Under Fort Worth International Airport

The arrival of the Jet Age has brought growing pains to airports across the country, and Greater Southwest International Airport at Fort Worth is no exception.

Contracting a jet-size runway at this airport meant extending it across Highway 183 and the obvious engineering answer to that problem was a tunnel that would carry the highway under the runway.

PPG UN-9630 High Solids Epoxy, applied to a dry film thickness of 10 to 12 mils, was specified for the tunnel's concrete surface because of the product's excellent tensile strength, bridging properties, and washing properties when subjected to strong detergent.

When the painting contract was sub let to Pinner & Cooney, Inc. Gus F. Walker, CRC Representative from the Dallas District Office and Gilbert Ryker, Technical Dept., sold the firm on the Pittsburgh coating. Tests added final proof that the PPG High Solids Epoxy was the right product for the job and it was later approved by the engineers and City of Fort Worth Inspectors.


The excellent tensile strength of High Solids Epoxy was a very important factor in this job. Gus says, "The tunnel's surface concrete had numerous hairline cracks and some wide joints had been filled with a soft grout. 



LOOKING FOR FREE TAX PREPARATION ASSISTANCE?

Tax counselors will answer your questions and also assist with the preparation of your 2016 tax forms utilizing IRS-approved, professional computer programs. Locations are in senior centers, libraries, recreation centers, community centers and some retirement homes.

What to bring:

- Proof of identification (photo ID)
- Social Security cards for you, your spouse and all claimed dependents. An Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) may be substituted
- Birth dates for all listed on the tax return
- Wage and earning forms
- Brokerage statements
- Total paid for daycare and the provider’s tax identifying number
- Affordable Health Care Statements. Forms:1095-A, -B or -C
- Health Insurance Exemption Certificate, if received
- A blank check so you may use direct deposit of any refund
- Last year’s (2015) tax return. **WE WILL NOT BE ABLE TO ASSIST YOU WITH YOUR TAX RETURN IF YOU DO NOT BRING IT.**

NOTE: We electronically file tax returns, and both spouses must sign the required forms on a married-filing-join return.

The Tax-Aide program **begins February 1st.** Most sites require an appointment, so please call ahead of time.

- **Go Red with like-minded women** - With the right information, education and care, heart disease in women can be treated, prevented and even ended. Women who GO RED are more likely to make healthy choices like these:
 - ⇒ Nearly 90 percent have made at least one healthy change in their daily lives.
 - ⇒ More than 1/3 have lost weight.
 - ⇒ More than 50 percent have increased their exercise.
 - ⇒ 6 out of 10 have made healthy changes to their diets.
 - ⇒ More than 40 percent have checked their cholesterol levels.
 - ⇒ 1/3 have talked with their doctors about developing heart health plans.
- **Take command of your recovery**
 - ⇒ Learn to love labels. Focus on filling your life with healthy eating choices.
 - ⇒ Find ways to stay active. You don’t have to become a gym rat but you do have to get moving.
 - ⇒ Go easy on yourself. Try to manage your expectations and don’t expect miracles overnight.
 - ⇒ De-stress. Whatever puts you in a calm and happy zone, find the time to do it.
 - ⇒ Don’t think you have to change your plans. Ultimately, being a survivor means living. So, try to resume a normal lifestyle.
- **Tackle your emotions** - Getting emotional support from others is an important step on your road to recovery.
- **Toss pride out the window** - If you feel like this is too much to deal with on your own, put your pride aside and seek assistance. Get counseling, turn to support groups, whatever feels right to you.

• Drainage and utility work continues in Euless. • Intersection work is progressing at all three major intersections in Euless. • Girders, panels and bridge deck are being placed at Industrial Blvd. and Ector Dr. • Traffic is tentatively scheduled to switch onto new bridge structures over SH 183 by Summer 2017. • Main St. bridge work continues as traffic switches have been implemented to accommodate the columns of the new bridge. • Main

the next exit ramp to Heritage Trace Parkway and then will return to North Tarrant Parkway via the southbound frontage road. • Progress continues in the SH 121, Spur 280 and Northside/Yucca areas, in addition to the continued work at the interchange and in areas north, around Basswood Boulevard and Western Center Boulevard.

• The new I-35W northbound frontage road extension between Basswood Boulevard and North Tarrant Parkway is now open, resulting in a new traffic pattern. Drivers are encouraged to be aware of the changes when taking this road. • Nightly closures, except Saturdays, on the off-ramp from northbound I-35W to North Tarrant Parkway will be in place for the construction of the new northbound entrance ramp from Basswood Boulevard. Traffic will be redirected to

temporary pavement and temporary driveways at various locations. Various lane closures are possible from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., and SH 26 could be reduced to one lane, weather permitting. • The \$38.2 million project in Colleyville from John McCain Road to Brown Trail will improve mobility and safety, and consists of the widening of SH 26 from four lanes with a continuous left turn lane to six lanes with raised curb medians with left turn bays, continuous sidewalks and improved signals. • The SH 26 construction project has started with preliminary construction activity. Message boards are posted advising motorists of daily lane closures. Motorists can expect to see construction activity continue over the coming weeks including the placement of traffic control devices and erosion control measures, the installation of temporary traffic signals, surveying crews, and the installation of drainage. Motorists can also expect to see the installation of tempo-

around the perimeter of the intersection and to place the permanent traffic signals. North of the intersection, crews continue to reconstruct the new southbound lanes between Fawkes Lane and Florence Road which includes a new retaining wall located along the west side of FM 1938. Construction is also continuing on some of the remaining side streets connecting from the west side of FM 1938. • The 1.6 mile project will widen the roadway to two lanes in each direction with raised curbed medians and will expand the intersection at FM 1709 so there will be two turn lanes in all directions. The project also includes landscaping along the roadway with illumination and sidewalks on both sides of the roadway provided by the city of Southlake. • The FM 1938 road construction project in Southlake and Keller from Randol Mill Avenue to FM 1709 (Southlake Boulevard) is planned for completion in 2017 for \$20 million. Construction at the FM 1938 and FM 1709 intersection has reached substantial completion (all lanes opened as of the end of December) with significant mobility improvements experienced by motorists. Some daily lane closures during off-peak periods can still be expected to finish work in the medians,
